Show Synopsis

In a whimsical adventure, Toad, Rat, Mole, and Badger learn that by working together and respecting nature, they can protect their beautiful home from harm and keep it thriving for all to enjoy.

Post-show

- What is your favorite part about being outside?
- What are some things you do to help protect the Earth?
- Have you ever had an adventure with your friends? What did you do? How was it similar to what you think might happen in the play?
- What do you think about Toad's changes throughout the story? What does it mean to learn from our mistakes?
- If you could have a day of adventure with one of the characters, who would it be and what would you do?
- What else would you like to explore about nature?

Theatre 101

PLAYWRIGHT: The person who writes the script.

DIRECTOR: The person in charge of orchestrating the entirety of the production. They lead the actors, designers, and production crew to put the show on its feet.

COSTUMES: What the actors wear during the show.

SCENERY: Everything on stage (except props) used to represent the setting, or the place in which the story is occurring.

PROPS: All physical items on stage with the exception of the scenery. This includes lamps, chairs, pens, paper, books, and more!

LIGHTS: Stage lights illuminate the actors so that they look their best. The colors used, focus of the light, and amount of lighting sets the mood and environment of a scene.

SOUND: Everything you hear during a performance that doesn't come from the actors.

ACTORS: The actors are the people that perform the show on- stage.

AUDIENCE: The lucky people that get to watch the show!

Audience Rules

- Be a Good Audience: Keep quiet—no talking, sleeping, or poking your neighbor. The actors can see and hear you, so let's not distract them!
- **Leave Gadgets at Home**: No phones, cameras, or tablets during the show. They might distract everyone.
- **React at the Right Time**: Laugh, clap, and cry when it feels right. And don't forget to give a big clap at the end!
- Stay in Your Seat: Stay seated throughout the show. It helps everyone see and enjoy.
- Bathroom Before the Show: Visit the bathroom before the performance starts.

Activity: SoundScape

- Gather 'Round: Everyone stand in a big circle!
- **Pick a Theme**: Let's choose a fun theme for our sounds! Examples: magical forest, a busy city, space
- **Start the Beat:** One brave person starts with a simple sound, like "stomp, stomp, stomp, stomp" or "clap, clap, clap." Let's get the rhythm going!
- Add Your Sound: One by one, each person adds their own sound that fits our theme. if the theme is space maybe you say "beep, boop, beep, boop" like the buttons of a rocket ship. Remember to keep it in rhythm!
- Move with It: Make your sound extra special with a fun movement! If you say "whoooooosh," you could swing your arms like you're flying through the air!
- **Keep It Going:** Once everyone has added their sound and movement, let's keep the groove alive until the last person goes!
- Have a Blast!: Enjoy making your magical machine of sounds and movements together! Let's make some awesome noise!

Discussion Activity:

- How did the characters show they cared for the Earth?
 Can you think of similar ways we can help our environment?
- How do the characters show teamwork when they face challenges? Why is teamwork important?
- How do you feel when you see beautiful trees, flowers, or animals? What can we do to keep them safe?
- Why is it important to be nice to nature and to each other?

Bring The Show To Life

Before diving into the scene below, talk with your class about the different elements in a play. What is the setting of the scene? What is the conflict?

What props could they use to help tell the story?

Sample Scene Questions

Why do you think Toad is so dramatic about his motorcar?
How would you react if something you loved was ruined?

What do Rat, Mole, and Badger want Toad to understand about his actions?

How do each of the characters move ther bodies differently from one another? (Think about what kind of animals they are)

What background sounds or actions could you incorporate to enhance the "poop poop" sound effect?

Actors build a character by pretending to be someone or something else. The following things help actors portray the character to the best of their ability.

Breathe Easy: Trees and plants on Earth produce oxygen, which we need to breathe. One large tree can provide enough oxygen for two people!


Speedy Spin: Earth spins on its axis at about 1,000 miles per hour, but we don't feel it because we're moving with it!
